Erika Alm earned her PhD. in History of Ideas at Göteborg University in 2006, and has as of September 2009 a postdoctoral position at Umeå University. Her dissertation "ett emballage för inälvor och emotioner": Föreställningar om kroppen i statliga utredningar från 1960- och 1970-talen ("A Container for Intestines and Emotions". Conceptions of the Body in Swedish Government Official Reports from the 1960s and 1970s) reconstructs the discourses on sex, gender, and desire, individual autonomy, and public interest, generated in the Swedish legislations on the management of gender reassignment, abortion and sterilization. Alm draws on Butler's reformulation of Aristotle's concepts form and matter into materialization, and argues that form has analytic qualities that makes it especially useful when analyzing body politics. The postdoctoral project draws on the historical and theoretical aspects of her dissertation. focusing on contemporary discourses on intersex, or disorder of sex development, in Sweden and the U.S. Alm studies the ethical implications of the controversies generated by intersex management and reform. email: erika.alm@ucqs.umu.se
